

New Requirement for 2025

All Ocean County RMG volunteers must serve a minimum of 3 hours in either Helpline or Tick Lab (in office), or at "Ask a Rutgers Master Gardener" events. To make it easier to understand which hours count, I have created a new category OUTREACH-HELPLINE ACTIVITIES on Better Impact

2025 Requirements for Volunteers' Service Hours

For VETERAN RMG Total of 35 hours, as follows:

- 25 Volunteer Service Hours broken down as:
 - 15 hrs. (minimum) in OUTREACH
 - A minimum of 3 hours MUST be served in the new OUTREACH-HELPLINE ACTIVITIES (Helpline or Tick Lab in office or at "Ask a Rutgers Master Gardener" events.)
 - **10 hrs. in OTHER** (OCP, General Meetings, or Admin/Committee Work) <u>or</u> extra OUTREACH hours are ok .too.
- 10 CONTINUING EDUCATION Hours- Coordinator approved CE programs

For INTERNS who have not completed hours in 2024, as follows:

Some Helpline and Tick Lab sessions are necessary, so you have some training in these areas-

- 60 Volunteer Service Hours broken down as:
 - 40 hrs. (minimum) in OUTREACH
 - A minimum of 3 hours MUST be served in the new OUTREACH- HELPLINE ACTIVITIES (Helpline or Tick Lab in office or at "Ask a Rutgers Master Gardener" events.)
 - 20 hrs. OTHER (OCP and Admin/Committee Work) or extra OUTREACH hours are ok too.
- No CONTINUING EDUCATION (CE) Hours are needed for Graduation

New Training and Continuing Education Classes

The training classes and Continuing Education classes for Ocean County RMGs are to help volunteers to feel confident with the procedures and duties performed while volunteering for events. **The training classes are mandatory**; the Continuing Education classes are not.

Just like Intern Classes, these new classes will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays starting January 16 and endingg April 17. The classes will be held here at the Ag Center in person or live via Zoom. Most classes will be recorded (if presenters allow) and available to view on CANVAS. The schedule of the training classes for 2025 is on CANVAS and posted in this newsletter. I color-coded (of course I did) the training and educational classes.

Volunteers must access Rutgers CANVAS to participate. A Rutgers CANVAS invitation email went out on Monday, 12/23/2024. All class materials and quizzes will be there as well. The class on January 16 will go over navigating CANVAS, the new additions to Better Impact, and info on Protection of Minors training for those who might be interested. Volunteers must attend or watch the recording and complete the coursework for the Training classes to qualify to see the opportunities on Better Impact for these OUTREACH events. The first 2 training classes (January 16 and 21) are mandatory for all RMGs. Training classes for specific volunteer areas are mandatory if you want to volunteer in that area.

For Example:

- If you want to be qualified to volunteer in the Helpline, you need to attend/zoom the class or watch the recordings of all OTHER Training/Helpline Classes on Feb. 4, Mar. 13, and Mar 27.
- To volunteer for Speakers' Bureau, you must attend/zoom the class or watch the recordings of all OTHER Training/Speakers' Bureau on Jan 23 and Feb 20.
- For Community Outreach Events, you must must attend/zoom the class or watch the recording of the OTHER Training Community Outreach Events on Feb 25.
- For Tick ID, you must take the March 20 class. Only Tick ID training will have an inperson exam with samples and a written portion that volunteers must pass with a
 minimum of 85% to be proficient for Tick Lab. Test will consist of 10 multiple choice
 questions and 10 physical identifications. Testing dates will be announced for Tick
 exam for participants.

For those who have limited computer access, there are 2 computers in the RMG room here at the Ag Center that can be used to access CANVAS and Better Impact.



Community Garden

The Community garden raised a wide variety of vegetables and herbs which were delivered to several local food pantries including:

St. Gregory's St. Joseph's SOS St. John's St. Mary's Blessed and Dressed Pantry

The Community Garden donated a total of 1,435.5 pounds of produce to local pantries. This figure includes 136.5 pounds of produce donated by Master Gardeners from their personal gardens and 103.25 pounds from Home Grown Garden. Therefore, the Community raised and donated 1195.75 pounds.

This year we introduced bush cucumbers, watermelons, and patio eggplants to our plant list.



Happy New Year, Everyone! Are you ready for another stellar year in the greenhouse? Well, we certainly are!

Thanks to Al Soyster and Mel Russen, the GH – including all the walls, floors, and benches – has been sanitized. Yvonne Klock, Jennifer McKeever, and Sandy Pilitowski cleaned the lights, which are now sanitized and ready for duty. (Boy, that was a big job! Glad it's done.)

Many thanks to Joe Scutro, who dragged in a bale of ProMix and helped us move things around. We still have a few more things to do, but we are done with the hard stuff.

On Monday, Jan 6, Dwulet's will deliver ProMix for the GH, HH, and WH. (MGs, you will still need to go to their garden center to pay for and pick up the individual bales you ordered through Bart.) We expect the Griffin order to arrive during the second or third week of January. The seeds we ordered have arrived; and the plug order has been confirmed and will be ready for pick-up during the second week of March. Sounds like we're ready, right?

Well, not quite. We still haven't heard from YOU!

As of today, we do not have enough volunteers to cover the workweek. Veterans, please let Mary Townsend know whether you plant to return. And Interns, please considered joining us this year. Pondering Plants

Oh, the weather outside is frightful But the tropics are so delightful Iguanas eat orchids and so Just say no, just say no



After enjoying the fortuity of a lengthy escape to Rincon, Puerto Rico, my daughter and I viewed multiple examples of orchids attached to trees that were flourishing. Based on our observations, we decided to experiment. We had no clue on how the actual process worked. We also were not fluently bilingual and could not garner a tutorial. During our RMG internship in 2022, we had joyfully shared images of this thriving orchid experiment. After 5 years of being anchored to a palm tree, the orchids actually bloomed. Irresistibly, the experiment needed replication. This time the purchase came from a vendor who had not marked the pots with genus and species. There was neither an understanding of the orchid's light needs nor a hint of the color. The "known" was that each pot was a thrifty \$4.00/plant and worth our time. Blindly, four (4) healthy leafed plants were purchased and tied to a palm tree with an old cut-up pillowcase.

Consumer horticultural experimentation combined with naiveté can be costly, time consuming and disappointing. Regardless of these pitfalls and a fast forward to 2024 - ALAKAZAM - we have blooms in striking yellow, pinks, purples, and magenta. Some bore an additional spike of fragrant buds to follow. 
